During reading skills

Monitor (stop and ask questions)

Clarify (visualize, check understanding of text and words)

Make connections (how is this like other things you know about?)

TEXT TO TEXT
CONNECTION

You are connecting the characters, setting, or events from one story to another.

TEXT TO SELF
CONNECTION

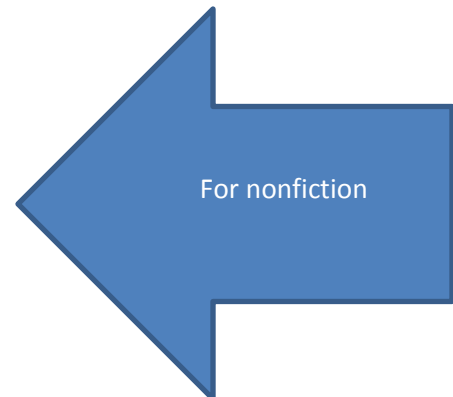
You are connecting the story to your own life, experiences, and feelings.

- Summarize: Can you give a brief description of the reading (main idea and some detail)?

The one Strategy to do before, during and after

Think aloud

When we question, make connections and discuss the text or passage as we look at it and read it.

Talk to the text

Similar to a think aloud but is done with "pen and paper." In other words, make notes, highlight etc on the text itself.

Some Types of Context Clues

Synonym	A synonym, or word with the same meaning, is used in the sentence. Hint words = "or"
Antonym	A word or group of words that has the opposite meaning reveals the meaning of an unknown term. Hint words: "but" "on the other hand" "unlike"
Explanation	The unknown word is explained within the sentence or in a sentence immediately preceding. Hint: The definition is often given directly after the unknown word and inside commas.
Example	Specific examples are used to define the term. Hint: There is at least one detail or example of the word provided in the sentence or adjacent sentences.
